1.	Welcome and Apologies	
1.1	The Chair welcomed members to the meeting and noted apologies as above. As this was the first meeting of the year, the Chair extend Happy New Year wishes to all members in attendance, and introduced Andriana Alkiviadou as the new administrator for the Partnership.	
2.	Minutes from Previous Meeting	
2.1	The minutes of the previous meeting on 10 <sup>th</sup> October 2023 were agreed as a true and accurate record, with the following amendment. Paragraph 5.2, bullet point 5 should state that the Social Care Collaborative Forum (SCCF) agreed to stand down the IMPACT workstream at its September meeting.	
3.	Matters Arising	
	Social Care Register data and intelligence presentation was shared by Hollie Bishop as agreed in previous meeting.	
4.	Social Care Workforce Development update	
4.	<ul> <li>Marian O'Rourke (MOR) noted that the work of the Partnership's workforce subgroup is closely aligned to the SCCF workforce workstream. Subgroup members discussed this and gave consideration as to whether or not the Partnership's workforce subgroup should stand down. However, subgroup members concluded that it is important to retain the subgroup for a further period of time to ensure the Partnership's contribution to the wider programme of work. The subgroup has agreed to hold their meetings a couple of weeks before the SCCF workforce workstream, in order to prepare their input into the workstream.</li> <li>MOR and Catherine Maguire (CM) gave a brief update on social care workforce development activity:</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>MOR stated that the Care in Practice framework will be included in the Social Care workforce strategy being developed by the Department of Health (DoH). This is significant in supporting the development of the workforce moving forward.</li> <li>CM advised that there is currently work in progress to map children's social care to the Safe and Effective Care Practice certificate and to look at how these will</li> </ul>	

	<ul> <li>align to create a certificate with 2 different pathways for adult's social care and children's social care. She explained that the team is working on the narrative of the Care in Practice Framework as the feedback from both DoH and other stakeholders indicated that greater clarity is needed to understand the framework and what will be required. More information about the pilot of the certificate will also be made available before it commences.</li> <li>CM noted that DoH has provided 50K funding to support social care workers to gain qualifications. Requests for funding have been oversubscribed and the Social Care Council is in discussions with DoH regarding the possibility of further funding to support increased qualifications attainment. Mervyn Bothwell (MB) noted that the qualifications that are being funded include those at vocational Levels 3,4 and 5, with the majority of funding supporting level 5 qualification attainment.</li> <li>In response to a question about the implementation of the Care in Practice certificate and resources required MB stated that the pilot of the certificate will help to identify any implementation issues, including resource requirements. MB provided further information on the certificate stating that it will be endorsed by OCN and will include 7 modules which mirror existing employer training. CM informed members that there is a Social Care Workforce looks like in Children's services. That survey will also support work to define social care.</li> </ul>

5.1 Social care campaign - workshc	<ul> <li>Rita McCullagh (RMcC) provided a presentation evaluating the Social Care Campaign that took place during the summer of 2023 with the following key points:</li> <li><i>"This campaign builds, it doesn't restart"</i> was one of the messages RMcC shared. The campaign is moving into year 4.</li> <li>Specifically focusing on a career campaign, the strategy had 3 priorities: <ul> <li>a) to continue to use existing promotional assets and build on these, for example, a fresh photography project took place which was a collaboration with all</li> </ul> </li> </ul>	

<ul> <li>HSC Trusts and community and voluntary sector organisations;</li> <li>b) Public relations and digital campaign, which involved a media launch, PR campaign, social media campaign and partner and school engagement;</li> <li>c) Stakeholder engagement which is still engoing.</li> <li>As part of the work to raise the profile of social care the CEO and Chair of the Social Care Council will be meeting with a range of stakeholders, including political parties, to discuss the work of the Coundi I to promote, support and develop the social care workforce.</li> <li>The campaign launch received significant media coverage and RMcC shared some of the newspapers articles and also gave an overview of the social media analytics showing engagement with the campaign.</li> <li>She finished her presentation with recommendations and learning from this campaign and also next steps for this year's campaign. The Communication Workstream is holding a workshop on the 26<sup>th</sup> January to plan the 24/25 campaign.</li> <li>Agnes Lunny (AL) also added that the membership of the communication workstream has been extended to include a representative from trusts as well as community and voluntary sector. 	Ryan Williams (RW) added that there are definitely concerns about the pressures in social care and even though good work has been done on the promotional campaigns he believes that there will still be a risk unless the appropriate funding for each sector is in place to ensure better salaries to be able to attract social care workers.	
	Patricia Higgins (PH) acknowledged all of these issues and added that the SCCF is in the process of developing a work plan for next year, which should include a risk framework.	
	She also acknowledged the importance of the campaign and how it presents the story of social care for the first time which is helping people to understand the value of social care and what it does. She also informed members that Sorcha Eastwood, Alliance, has approached the Council for assistance with an All-Party Working Group she is establishing to review skills development and investment in NI. The first area she wants to focus on is Social Care. The Social Care Council will help the APWG develop its engagement plan.	
6.	Social Care Data & Intelligence Update – presentation by Ryan Williams	
6.1	<ul> <li>Ryan Williams (RW) was invited to present as Chair of the Social Care Data &amp; Intelligence group, to discuss the value of data and how it could be used to help with the work that this Partnership is doing. His presentation focused on:</li> <li>How data analytics and research can inform commissioning and inform recruitment of social care workers.</li> <li>Using Connected Health anonymised data, a picture of the delivery of Home Care within Northern Trust and Belfast Trust was presented, as a rural and urban example.</li> </ul>	
	<ul> <li>The comparative difference between the two Trusts in terms of urban and rural areas focussing on unmet need, carer location and the client location.</li> <li>Data from the census which looked at citizen profile across both the Northern Trust and the Belfast Trust.</li> <li>Northern Trust has significant travel issues compared to Belfast Trust given its geography.</li> </ul>

11.1	<ul> <li>SB introduced Anne McGlade (AMcG) and invited her to give Members a brief outline of her role and what to expect for the upcoming months on the research and evidence agenda. AMcG noted the following priority actions:</li> <li>To establish a Partnership which will be a committee of the Board, chaired by Board member Davy Hayes from QUB. This is at a developmental stage. MO'R, PH and AMcG have meetings scheduled with individuals, including social care, clinical research networks, the R&amp;D office, academia and the DoH.</li> <li>A workshop will be held in April focussed on developing the research infrastructure and priorities.</li> <li>AMcG noted that there is a research community already in place and active since 2020, which includes a wide range of social work, social care organizations and service users, carers, and academia.</li> <li>She also informed members about the Research conference that will take place on the 20<sup>th</sup> March 2024 and members are welcome to attend.
